The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought Captain John DS. Phillips, the result. The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LONG 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899.


"Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in. "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line". Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime.

He called his navigators to the bridge to check & double check the ship's position. He

do so, whether they could have accurately achieved that feat given the navigational technology of the time is an open question. The story is still interesting as a hypothetical 'what could have happened' and provides great teachable moments even if the actual event

engine speed. The calm weather & clear night worked in his favor. At midnight the SS *Warrimoo* lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line! The consequences of this bizarre position were many.


The bow of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere and in the middle of summer. The stern was in the Northern Hemisphere and in the middle of winter. The date in the aft portion of the ship was 31 December 1899.


In the bow it was 1 January 1900. This ship was therefore not only in two different days, two different months, two different years, and two different seasons, it was actually in two different

centuries - all at the same time!

HAPPY NEW YEAR, MATES!

This account may very well be true, but the fact that it apparently wasn't reported until more than 40 years after the fact is a potential cause for skepticism. Other forms of documentation -- such as copies of the ship's log, contemporaneous reporting of the event, and accounts from other *Warrimoo* crew and passengers -- would go a long way towards verifying the claim, but nothing has been found that suggests any such documentation exists. Additionally, even if the *Warrimoo*'s crew had the *intent* of positioning the ship so that it simultaneously spanned the equator and 180th meridian precisely at midnight on 31 December 1899 and attempted to





Ultimate fate: *Warrimoo* was a troop ship in the First World War. In 1918 the French destroyer *Catapulte* collided with *Warrimoo* in the Mediterranean. In the collision some of *Catapulte*'s depth charges broke loose and fell into the sea, where they detonated and sank both ships.




USS Constitution Sails & Yards by Bob Frysztak
